- 3. What's the significance of Paul shifting from the office of the overseer, to desiring **the work** of an overseer?
- 4. How may bad experiences or poor examples have tainted your view of church leadership? Ask God to help you align your view with His design and His Word and understand pastoral ministry is a "good work and noble task."
- 5. What are some components of a pastor's work? See Acts 20:17-35; 1 Tim 4:14; 5:17; Heb 13:7; James 5:14; 1 Pet 5:1-5
 - a. What do the terms "overseer" and "shepherd" teach us about the pastor's work?
- 6. How can you serve and support elders to fulfil their primary responsibilities?
 - a. What might some responsibilities be that the elders **should not** give their attention to and how can you be involved to help in these areas?
- 7. Given the work of the pastor/elders as stewards of God's flock, who will give an account for your soul, what are some of the ways you should relate with the elders?
